A compilation of over 1,450 unusual words contained in the King James Version (A.V.) of the Holy Bible.

Dear Reader,

This booklet is a compilation of certain words found in the KJV (AV) translation of the Bible, as revised in 1769. It includes those words that are generally not part of today's vocabulary, or if they are, then the Sixteenth–Eighteenth Century meaning of the words contrast with that of today. For example, who would immediately recognise that 'rising up early' meant 'repeatedly, persistently'?

It should be noted, however, that not *every* use of a specified word may have the same meaning, but the Scriptural reference will show at least one place where the word carries the nominated meaning.

The listing is not exhaustive, but it covers most of the words that may need further explanation to gain the meaning of the message.

As you read the KJV, you may meet a word you don't know, and it is not listed in this booklet. If so, check it in a responsible modern translation that is based on a word-for-word approach, such as the FSV or NASB.

It is hoped that this Concise KJV Dictionary might help and increase your understanding of the Word of God.

Reading tip:

The King James Version translators followed Tyndale, of the early 16th Century, by writing some verb forms with word-endings of *-eth* and *-ith*, such as *readeth*. These words have generally been omitted from this dictionary as they can be easily read in modern English simply by substituting the *-eth* or *-ith* endings with the letter *s*. e.g. readeth = reads; loveth = loves; goeth = goes; saith = says.
